They said that women with Acute Coronary Syndrome (ACS) receive inferior or less aggressive treatment compared to men. The CREATE registry of 100,000 patients in India revealed that relatively fewer women are

Moreover, these women are older, reach hospital later, more prone to risk, receive inferior treatments and have worse outcomes.

"These three studies paint a consistent picture around the world and all serve to demonstrate that women with ACS are unfortunately not receiving the same treatment as men," said Professor Sidney C Smith, President of World Heart Federation.

Dr. Ramakant Panda, Chief of Asian Heart Institute, who is attending the Dubai conference agreed to the studies' findings.

He said, "Most of the women who come to us with heart diseases come late and often when complications have taken place. This is why outcomes are poor and the complications related to CVDs are higher. Heart attack mortality among women is also higher due to smaller heart vessels."

CVD, which includes heart disease and stroke, is the biggest killer of women globally causing 8.6 million deaths annually. Women in low and middle-income countries who develop CVD are more likely to die from it than comparable women in industrialized nations.

It is only a little over 100 years that woman's claim to equality has been recognized. All previous ages have treated women as inferior to men. Little thought and less money was spent on their education. Their place was in the home for which no training was necessary. When they married, they became subject to their husbands. They were unable to own anything and unable even to agree to anything apart from him. They had to do as their husbands told them. All this was regarded as the natural state of affairs. Women themselves accepted it. They were brought up to believe it. The only compensation they had – or rather which some of them had – was that in some periods and in some classes men were expected to treat women with courtesy and kindness. But that only served to emphasise the superiority of man and the inferiority of woman. It showed her as dependent on the generosity which he was magnanimous enough to bestow.

Some philosophers have in times past advocated the equality of women, but they have often been regarded as unpractical theorists. It was Plato nearly 2,400 years ago (circa 400 BC) who first had sufficient independence of mind to assert that there should be equality. It a remarkable thing to do, because the Athenian woman of his day was in no way the equal of her husband; she was not the entertainer of his guests or the mistress of his house, but only his housekeeper and the mother of his children. Every woman in Athens had always to remain under the tutelage of some male. Wife and daughters

were kept in strict seclusion. Though custom permitted them, when attended by female slaves to go for a walk, they would not stop to converse with men, nor would they ever attend a meal at which men were present. In short, it was their duty always to keep in the background. A very different ideal of womanhood was held up by Plato to the world. She was to be the companion of the man, and to share with him in the toils of war and in the cares of government.

She could not in those days get an order for maintenance against her husband. She had to find someone who would take her in out of pity or charity or on the husband's credit. Can a bank be held liable if a customer is robbed inside the bank premises, but before he has deposited cash with the cashier? The National Consumer Disputes Redressal Commission has delivered conflicting verdicts.

In a recent judgment NCDRC ruled that a bank's security guard is under no obligation to provide security to account holders, and therefore, the bank cannot be forced to compensate a customer whose money has been snatched by someone in the bank. This is in conflict with NCDRC's own 2005 judgement, in which it held that any security lapse in a bank would amount to "deficiency in service" under the Consumer Protection Act and that the bank would have to compensate the customer.

Experts said the Supreme Court will now have to decide which precedent is legally tenable.

In the recent case, a bench headed by Justice KS Chaudhari ruled that the bank's security guard is not under any obligation to provide security to an account holder. "If a customer is assaulted by another customer inside the bank, or its security guard can be held responsible," the bench said.

It disagreed with Haryana State Consumer Disputes Redressal Commission, Panchkula that had directed State Bank of Patiala rupees 25,000 to one of its customers, Krishan Kaul, who was robbed while the bank guard was watching a procession outside.

The bench ruled that the money in Kaul's hands was not the bank's property till it was handed over to the cashier.

Supreme Court advocate Aysweria Bhatti said the judgement defies common logic."A bank cannot be equated with a grocery shop, because people got to the bank to transact valuables. It is the responsibility of the bank once customers are inside. The bank must ensure the valuables they come with are transacted safely." Hindustan Times, November 08, 2013

It is only a little over 100 years that woman's claim to equality has been recognized. All previous ages have treated women as inferior to men. little thought and less money was spent on their education. Their place was in the home for which no training was necessary. When they married, they became subject to their husbands. They were unable to own anything and unable even to agree to anything apart from him. They had to do as their husbands told them. All this was regarded as the natural state of affairs. Women themselves accepted it. They were brought up to believe the only compensation they had - or rather which some of them had - was that in some periods and in some classes men were expected to treat women with courtesy and kindness. But that only served to emphasize the superiority of man and the inferiority of woman. It showed her as dependant on the generosity which he was magnanimous enough to bestow.

It was a remarkable thing to do, because the Athenian woman of his day was in no way the equal of her husband; she was not the entertainer of his guests or the mistress of his house, but only his housekeeper and the mother of his children. Every woman in Athens had always to remain under the tutelage of some male. Wife and daughters were kept in strict seclusion. Though custom permitted them, when attended by female slaves, to go for a walk, they would not stop to converse with men, nor would they ever attend a meal at which male guests were present. In short, it was their duty always to keep in the background. A very different ideal of womanhood was held up by Plato to the world. She was to be the companion of the man, and to share with him in the toils of war and in the cares of government. She was to be educated in the same way as he. "...let them share in the toils of war and the defence of their country; only in the distribution of the labours, the lighter are to be assigned to the women, who are the weaker natures, but in other respects their duties are to be the same."

The issue hasn't changed, but we have. Landowners around the world are engaged in an orgy of soil destruction so intense that the world on average has just 60 more years of growing crops. To keep up with global food demand, the UN estimates, 6m hectares of new farmland will be needed every year. Instead, 12m hectares a year are lost through soil degradation. We wreck it, then move on, trashing rainforests and other precious habitats as we go.

This is the International Year of Soils, but you wouldn't know it. There's no longer even an appetite for studying the problem. This is what topples civilisations. War and pestilence might kill large numbers of people, but in most cases the population recovers. But lose the soil and everything goes with it. Now, globalization ensures that this disaster is reproduced everywhere. In its early stages, globalization enhances

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resilience: people are no longer dependent on the vagaries of local production. But as it proceeds, spreading the same destructive processes to all corners of the Earth it undermines resilience, as it threatens to bring down systems everywhere.

The observations came while the court was hearing a plea filed by a Pune resident, challenging a family court order that had directed him to pay, besides the interim maintenance to his estranged wife, the EMIs and the maintenance charges of the flat in which the woman was living with their children.

The man had argued that it was difficult for him to pay the EMIs and maintenance charges that together amounted to almost Rs 7 lakh.

The wife argued that she was no longer working and owing to their dispute, the EMIs had been paid for a few months and that the bank had threatened to dispossess them of the flat.

The man said, in case the woman and their children were dispossessed of the said flat, he would make arrangements for them to reside in another flat.

However, justice MS Sonak, who was presiding over the matter, ruled that the said flat where the couple lived together before they separated, constituted the shared household, or the matrimonial home for the woman under the DV Act, and thus, she could not be deprived of the same.
